

Llandudno Pier

Llandudno Pier is a Grade II* listed pier and at 2,295 feet, (700 m) over the sea, the pier is the longest in Wales and the fifth longest in England and Wales. The iron pier was built in two phases – the straight section (from the gate near Happy Valley) was opened to the public on 1 August 1877. The spur, which now gives Llandudno Pier its main entrance from the promenade was added in 1884. It offers superb views of the Irish Sea and the North Wales Coast. On top of the stunning views you can enjoy a relaxing stroll with excellent food stalls and concessions to find the perfect gifts and souvenirs.

Llandudno Ski and Snowboard Centre

Happy Valley is a sheltered hollow on the East side of the Great Orme National Park. The lower slopes of the park consist mainly of informal gardens with a tea pavilion. Higher up the Valley you will find the Llandudno Ski and Snowboard Centre with a fine artificial ski slope, at 300 metres. A year-round centre offering an artificial ski & boarding slope, sno-tubing, toboggan run, tubing & alpine adventure golf. The ski centre has its own Swiss Chalet café and shop.

Great Orme Tramway

To the West of you can take a ride on the Great Orme Tramway to just below the summit of the Great Orme headland.

The Tramway is Britain's only funicular, or cable-hauled, tramway that travels on public roads. Re-live the experience of travel more than 100 years ago in the lovingly restored original tramcars, each named after a Saint. The unique journey begins at Victoria Station, a short distance from Llandudno's seaside and pier. The Great Orme's dynamic beauty, rich history and natural splendour are well worth the journey. At the summit you will find a Visitor Centre and Café.

Great Orme Mine

A visit to the Great Orme Mines is not to be missed as it is both an enjoyable and educational experience. Taking the self guided tour through tunnels mined out over 3,500 years ago visitors get a feel for the harsh conditions our prehistoric ancestors faced in their search for copper. The highlight of the tour is the amazing Bronze Age Cavern, dug out over 3,500 years ago. View the opencast mine and see how our ancestors turned rock into metal at the smelting shelter. Learn about later mining activity at the site and peer down the 145 metre deep Victorian mine shaft. The visitor centre, with introductory film, depicts life in the Bronze Age with Bronze Age artefacts on display.
